Bloomington Tragedy

Tragedy struck the Bloomington-Normal community early morning on Tuesday, April 7 when seven passengers of a plane were pronounced dead after the plane crashed into a farm field in Bloomington. Investigators have not yet determined the cause of the crash.

Among the seven people who were on board were two staff members of Illinois State University, Deputy Director of Athletics Aaron Leetch and Men's Basketball Associate Head Coach Torrey Ward. The ISU community is greatly mourning the loss of these two well-respected men. President of the University Larry Dietz released a personal statement after the news of the crash was made public in order to console the students who were close with the faculty members.

Although investigation is still underway, there are many facts that are known. It is known that Bloomington was covered in dense fog when the plane approached the airport. The plane was returning from Indianapolis, where the passengers were attending NCAA men's basketball championship game. Although the NTSB usually releases an initial report about a week after plane crashes, the full investigation of the Bloomington crash may take up to 18 months. The pilot, Hileman, did have a valid flying license and about 12,000 hours of flying experience. The last radio transmission from the plane, about five minutes before the crash, indicated that the plane was arriving as planned with no trouble at Central Illinois Regional Airport. It is due to these odd conditions of the accident that the full investigation will take longer than usual.

The passengers who were on the plane, including the two ISU staff members, along with their families will be kept in our thoughts and prayers throughout this rough time.

Movie Review

Fast and Furious 7

Even the family theme of the previous films is given less room this time. Most of that theme is expressed by Vin Diesel using the word "family" in a sentence. Letty, played by Michelle Rodriguez, goes on something like a vision quest early in the film, and then simply returns, with a lastditch scene late in the movie to explain what her inconsequential disappearance was about. The sheer spectacle of "Furious 7" — Universal Pictures crashed at least 230 vehicles during filming — led to enormous chatter on social media networks after its arrival on April 3, which in turn has kept demand high: The movie took in about \$60.6 million between Friday and Sunday, for a two-week total of \$252.5 million. That early total is simply massive. To compare, "Fast & Furious 6" took in less \$239 million — during its entire 15-week domestic run in 2013. "Furious 7" has sold an additional \$548 million in tickets overseas. With \$800 million worldwide, "Furious 7" is on track to be the first \$1 billion movie of the year. Some say that there will be a Fast and Furious 8 but who knows what the future holds.


Time to get your smarty pants on


