Many people look forward to Mother's Day weekend. Most enjoy this weekend by spending time with their mothers and grandmothers, while others dedicate themselves to the 5 k run near the Metro Centre in Peoria, IL. On May 9 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, around 8 A.M., hundreds of men, women, and children of all ages will line up behind the starting line to help reach a life without breast cancer.

Race for the Cure began after Susan G. Komen, a victim of breast cancer, died at the age of 36. It was launched by Susan's sister, Nancy G. Brinker, who promised Susan that she would do everything possible to end the shame, pain, fear, and hopelessness caused by this disease. Nancy began the uphill battle in 1982 and has invested more than $\$ 2.2$ billion in breast cancer research, education, screening, and treatment.

The negative effects of breast cancer are known around the world today. One in eight women in the U.S. are diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime. Because of this, every minute someone in the world dies from this deadly disease.

With the hard work done by Nancy and the outpouring of love and dedication from people around the world, the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure has increased the relative survival rate from $74 \%$ in the 1980's to $99 \%$ in 2015.

This Race, along with multiple charities and events aimed around breast cancer, helps to turn millions of breast cancer patients into breast cancer survivors.
